- Existing clinical reporting infrastructure

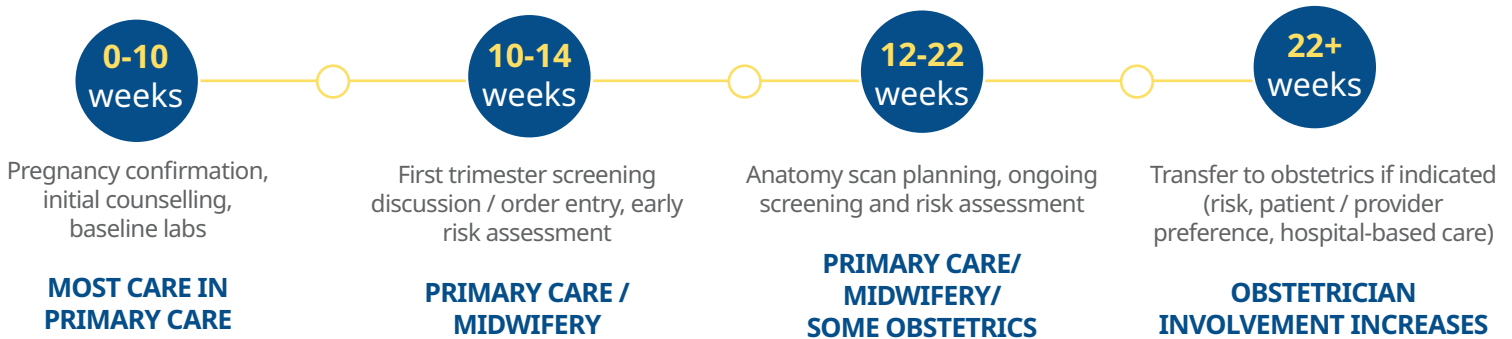


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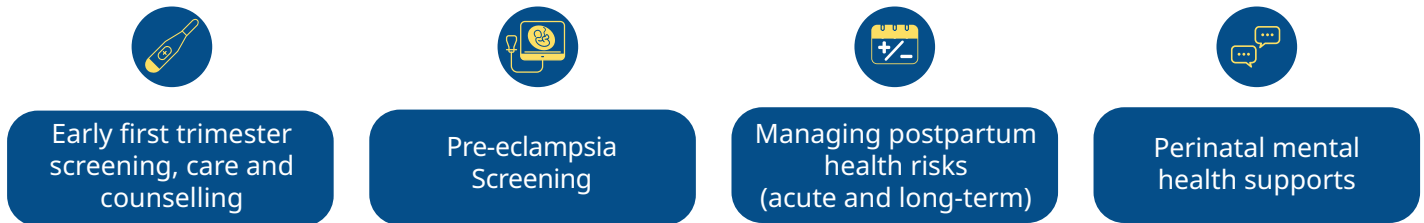
Real-time translation of relevant health information into clinical action at point of care and throughout the perinatal journey.

EXPECTED OUTCOMES



SHORT-TERM OUTCOMES

- Increased adherence to guidelines
- Higher screening and prevention uptake
- More consistent, high-quality counselling
- Reduced variation in care

INTERMEDIATE OUTCOMES

- Improved early risk identification
- Better patient understanding and informed decision-making
- Improved continuity from prenatal to postpartum care
- Reduced unwarranted variation

LONG-TERM OUTCOMES

- Improved maternal and neonatal health outcomes
- Practice and system level reporting and accountability
